Any Amritdhaaree (initiated Sikh) can perform the marriage ceremony

The ceremony can only be performed in a Sikh Gurdwara

Caste, social status, previous race or lineage should not be considered

No superstition or astrological days should be considered for the day or date

> Both man and woman are equal

Dowry is not allowed and costs of the marriage should be shared as equally as possible

> A Sikh can only have one partner

> > If their partner dies, a Sikh can remarry
